

Reality

School nurses are necessary parts of every school safety plan. Without our frontline nurses in our schools every day, we risk missing the physical and mental symptoms that could indicate a much larger problem. As a part of the strategic team for school safety, nurses provide a holistic approach to student health that alleviates the need for additional staff, while supporting the school, the school resource officer, safety plans, and the student.

The Ask

- Add the definition of "School Nurse" (found in 53E-1-102) to be included in the definitions within the School Security Act (53-22-101) and possibly for inclusion in the Task Force Membership (53-22-<u>104.1</u>).
- \$2 million in dedicated ongoing funding for the hiring and training of Utah School Nurses, with a built in annual increase of funding tied to WPU increases as a minimum.

The Outcomes

Schools are safer when they have a nurse in every school. Restoring funding to our school nursing staff allows them to play a crucial role in maintaining and enhancing the health and safety of students and staff. Here's how they contribute to a safer school environment:



Emergency Response

Immediate Medical Care, Crisis Response and Preparedness

Support for Students with Health Needs, Prevention of Crises

Nurses are the first to raise the red flag of mental health struggles



Early Intervention

Behaviors can be stopped and our nurses have the tools.

Timeline



Utah begins to acknowledge the School Nurse crunch while also recognizing the increases in classroom sizes and general student population.



15 years later, the Legislature conducts a study, finding that in WPU school nurses, while necessary, are not prioritized for hiring and training.



The legislature establishes a fund - School Nurses Matching Fund - to assist school districts and charters in increasing the number of school nurses working in public schools.



The fund is so well utilized that the Legislature authorizes additional dedicated funds, bringing the annual dedicated number to \$1,002,000.



Many line item or dedicated funds are rolled into the WPU, including the well used School Nurses Matching Fund. School administrators begin using those monies elsewhere.



School Nurses are incorporated into the School Safety Act, recognizing a school nurses valuable contributions to school safety, as well as the increasing need for every school to have a nurse.

Conclusion

Only 1% of our students have access to the nationally recommended student to nurse ratio. Only 12% of our students have access to the state suggested ratio. Since 2014, 20 pieces of legislation have passed expanding the responsibilities and roles of school nurses with zero funding attached to that expansion. This problem is now over 3 decades old. It is time to incorporate our on the ground first responders into the School Safety Act and create the best environment for our children and their future.
